A total of 86 Referees officiated during the year and were made up of 47 Seniors and 39 Juniors. This was by far our biggest year insofar as availability of members was concerned. However, the availability of some members appeared inconsistent with that shown on the "availability" slips handed in at the beginning of the season, as the Referees officiating on any weekend during the season were made up of 24 Seniors and 34 Juniors (58) for Saturdays and 33 Seniors and 15 Juniors on Sundays (48).

Towards the latter part of the season resentment of the Juniors participation in semi-finals etc. began to manifest itself, resulting in some members passing unkind comments outside the confines of where such discussions ought to be aired - the Meeting Room. For the record, Juniors were available for, and consistently officiated at, 60% of all Saturday games during the entire season. They officiated at 41% of semi-finals and grand finals.

The coverage by the Board during the year was less extensive than 1975 and one of the main contributing factors was the allocation of games by the Junior League, particularly on Sundays. A classic example is Round No.12 where 39 games were played on 24 grounds with 13 having one game, 7 with 2 and 4 grounds with 3 games. This was the case on practically every week-end. With only seven Board members, adequate coverage is impossible under these circumstances.

The Board endeavoured to adopt a positive approach to grading during 1976,

and perhaps this should in future be expanded to the assessing of Referee's performances. Too many reports submitted in 1976 appeared slanted towards mistakes made, indicating that the Board were looking for a Referees bad points as the criteria for assessment.

Looking for faults in a Referees game is no different to a Referee looking for penalties every time a scrum is formed. Looking for a Referees good points will not necessarily obscure mistakes that may occur, instead it should make for a more balanced assessment. Mistakes and errors will present themselves whether looked for or not. Even a relatively new Referee will give more correct decisions than wrong ones, and an experienced man will make ^{more} correct decisions in control, advantage and positional aspects than mistakes.

In the final analysis the stereotyping of Referees should be avoided. Assessment should be on an Individual controlling a particular game. Any relationship to a previous game controlled by another Referee should not be taken into consideration.

The retirement from the active ranks by Noel Cahill leaves a void at the top level that will not be easily filled. Whilst we do have good material further down the scale, his experience in all types of football will be missed. Noel joins the ranks of those who were unlucky not to be "graded". My thanks to the members of the Board who collectively logged in excess of 2200 hours and 5000 kilometres in attending meetings and manning grounds throughout the year.

Our meetings always well attended but fairly quiet, have become more truly meetings for Junior members, with vigorous, discussion of issues affecting the Junior Branch. It was good to see so many members, particularly the newer members, willing to air their views in an open meeting, instead of complaining privately to some sympathetic listener. Outstanding proof of this is our Merit Award, formulated and designed by a Junior Branch meeting. On behalf of the Junior Branch I would like to thank Messrs. Manuel, Harris and Cameron who by their Generosity, made the Merit Award a reality.

There was however, one feature of the meetings which was a constant source of annoyance to the Executive and to the Senior Members. It has been an honour to serve you and I can only hope that you give your new Executives the Help and respect you gave to the other members of the Executives and myself.

To close my report, I would like to say that I have never been honoured by any group of people in such a way as this Junior Branch has honoured me by presenting me with its Merit Award. It was the thrill of a lifetime to receive and will provide a great inspiration in the coming season, for having received it, I must now live up to it.

A NEGLECTED SKILL.

An examination of the minutes book reveals that in the season, Junior Referees addressed far more correspondence to the Junior Branch Secretary than in any previous season. The volume of this correspondence has allowed me to observe, with some alarm, that Juniors do not know how to construct or present a business letter. I am not talking about the level of expression contained in the letter as this is a matter of individual ability.

The simple mechanics of construction, however, should be learned and practised by all. These are simply: the address of the sender and date of writing, to whom the letter is being sent, salutation, introduction, main body, conclusion and close.

At a time when school leavers are finding it increasingly difficult to obtain jobs, students should set about attaining as many skills as they possibly can. Although the technique of letter writing is no longer of major importance in this age of telecommunications it is nevertheless a useful skill, a skill which would no doubt impress many old-fashioned employers, of whom there are still a great many. A lecture on this topic would be most beneficial and I make that suggestion to the incoming Executive.

CARRYING THE FLAG.

Undoubtedly one of the worst features of performances by Juniors this year was their attitude to Touch Judging.

You have somehow adopted the idea that a Touch Judge is in some way inferior to the Referee on the field. In all fairness it must be said that the best Referees will always be appointed to centres but this does not mean that because Touch Judges, may lack slightly in ability or experience they are less important in the control of a game.

The only distinction between the Referee and the Touch Judge once they are both on the field, the Referee carries a whistle while the Touch Judges each carry a flag. They are all nevertheless, Referees and together constitute the third team on the field. Between the three understanding and teamwork are essential if they are to successfully control the game.

There are two areas in which the Touch Judges decision will be final, touch and touch in goal and in the adjudication of goals. Vital as these decisions are, the greatest responsibility of the Touch Judge is to watch back play and report any incidents which may occur without the Referees knowledge.

Because the Referees appointed to Touch Judging duties play such an important role in the game it is essential that they are thoroughly professional in their approach to these duties. First of all your attendance and punctuality, you should be present at the official table, dressed and ready to go, no later than fifteen minutes before the SCHEDULED starting time for your match, just the same as the Referee. Your gear should be immaculate do not forget that you carry the Associations reputation as much as the man in the centre, and you, the Touch Judge are much closer to the public eye.

Before the game starts, talk to the Referee and the other Touch Judge and work out your "tactics" for the game. It is of paramount importance that each knows what the other members of the team want and need.

If necessary work out signals for indicating offside players at free kick, and signals to be made by the Referee to indicate that he has seen some act of misconduct and has decided to wait.

When you do have to report any incident, make your report at a time which allows the non offending team to gain the maximum advantage. Thus, if the team who are not in possession commit the breach, get to the Referee straight away (note that you do not wait) tell him that you wish to make a report and on whom, but tell him, and make it clear that he should play the advantage. After that, return to your touch line (SPRINTING) and wait until the Referee stops play and calls you in. If however, the teams with the ball offends again sprint to the Referee tell him you wish to make a report on whom you are reporting and that he should stop play. In either case though, go to the Referee as soon as you see a breach committed if and only if you are sure the Referee has not seen it.

In making the report, you speak to the Referee and to no one else. It is his job to call players out and discipline them in whatever way he feels is necessary. The Touch Judges' responsibility is to inform the Referee of something which has escaped his notice. DO NOT caution the players yourself, because this looks bad, the authority of the Referee suffers and all three of you will lose the respect of the players. To be a Touch Judge is to be a Referee assisting another Referee, equal in all but experience. Juniors are assigned to Touch Judges duties so that they may watch and learn. What you learn as a Touch Judge on Sundays, you should apply to your games on Saturdays and in time you will be given Sunday centres plus Touch Judging at higher grades so that you may progress even further.

As a Touch Judge you are the eyes in the back of the Referees head, so do not let him down by not showing up or even worse by not keeping your eyes open and watching behind the play. A good Referee can look three times better with two alert, efficient Touch Judges; with no Touch Judges he is still a good Referee, although he has to work much harder; but he looks ten times worse with Touch Judges who do not take their responsibilities seriously.
